

### Lake Christopher Pollution Study ...Duncan Bell

Faced with the prospect that a portion of the new Indian River Road project, roughly from the Indian River Nursery down to, and including, the intersection with Ferrell Parkway, would be drained into Lake Christopher, the Board of Directors commissioned Dr. Carl Erkenbrecker and Dr. Raymond Alden of ODU to do an impact study of the effect of the drainage on our lake. The final conclusion of the impact study was that provided that the water quality of the lake is good, the storm-waters runoff from the Indian River Road project should not have an acute impact on the lake.

The Board is presently researching the cost of having water sample studies conducted to determine the present status of the lake. Having spent \$1,250 for the pollution impact study and knowing that

adequate water sample testing could be expensive, the board is attempting to determine the most cost effective approach before proceeding further. Copies of the Pollution Impact Study are available from Duncan Bell, 467-8140.

How many phone calls have you received, but when you answered the phone no one answered or you could hear them disconnect? Do you realize it could be a potential burglar checking to see if anyone is at home? Talk to your neighbors-- many are getting phone calls like that!

Do you realize that out of the 10,000 burglaries in Virginia Beach, the Virginia Beach Police Department considers the Lake Christopher-Brigadoon area to have among the highest incidents of burglary right now? So high, in fact, that a crime analyst has written a notice to the Crime Prevention Department suggesting that Lake Christopher should be contacted and encouraged to form some sort of block security program.

Block security does work. There are two sections in Larkspur, one has block security, one does not. Police report that the section in which there is block security only four incidents have occurred. In the other section, hundreds of incidents have been reported.

Statistics show that ninety percent of all burglaries occur during the daytime and seventy-five percent of those are committed by juveniles.

Lake Christopher residents need to be made aware of this problem. Just because it hasn't happened to you does not mean you should ignore the issue. You could be next! We cannot allow this harassment to continue! Our investment and pride in Lake Christopher is at stake. If we all care about our neighborhood and our neighbors, we can stop these crimes of burglaries in our homes, siphoned gas, slashed tires, stolen bicycles and vandalism.

On the 16th of January a number of families in Lake Christopher woke to empty gas tanks, with the caps stolen. Some were found scattered around the streets later for extra annoyance. Again, be warned, but especially be aware of where your children are. Many of the growing number of incidents in our and other neighborhoods are done by our own young, bored residents. They deserve your attention now, before the seriousness of their pranks makes helping them impossible.

### Tidewater Children's Museum

The museum is located at 601 Court St. in Portsmouth, in the basement of the Portsmouth Public Library. The current exhibit, Water, Water Everywhere gives children many opportunities to explore "hands-on" exhibits related to water-sea life, sea shells, diving gear, various boats, and a water wheel. ### The Mariners Museum

The museum houses an incredible number of displays, a fascinating collection of model ships, over one hundred full-size boats, sea paintings, figure-heads and much historical information pertaining to man and the sea.

### The Peninsula Nature and Science Center

The center focuses on the ecology and environment of Virginia. They have many well done displays, hands on exhibits, live animals and an aquarium. They also schedule small-group demonstrations with live animals.
